

Relationship, Relationship, Relationship: An Exploration of Supportive Adult Behaviors in the Faith Development Of Catholic-Raised Youth

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Abstract

This study aims to analyze whether specific adult behaviors during the adolescent period could be associated with the participants' current religious identify; defined as Currently-Catholic or Previously-Catholic. Participants were asked to tell their story of growing up Catholic and to describe relationships with adults who played a role in their views and understanding of religion.

Participant Demographics

Twenty-four junior and senior students at a Catholic University were interviewed. All participants were Catholic-raised adults.

Adult Demographics

The 24 participants described a total of 275 adults. Adults were categorized into 6 different groupings and 7 different religious groupings.

Adult Behavior Themes

Positive Behaviors

Provided unconditional support

- Adult's support and approval was not contingent on religious identity

Facilitated/Had discussions about religion

- Adults encouraged, started, and were open to conversations about religion

Taught the Catholic religion

Adult taught and supported Church teachings

Modeled a Catholic lifestyle

- Adult applied faith to their daily life

Respected other religions

Adult respected and encouraged respect of other religions
 Connected youth to Catholic people/experiences

- Adult connected participants to other Catholic adults and events

Negative Behaviors

Provided conditional support

- Adult's supportive or lack of supportive behavior was due to participants' religious identity

Lacked/Discouraged religious conversations

- Adult exhibited negative reactions to questions/doubts and did not have complex religious conversations with participant

Taught incorrect religion information

Adult incorrectly taught Church teachings

Did not model a Catholic lifestyle

- Adult did not put their faith into practice

Disrespected other religions

- Adult was not respectful or open minded to other religions

Negative connections to Catholic activities

- Adult forced participant to participate when they did not want to or prevented participation because of gender or age

Note: Data highlighted showed statistically significant differences between Currently-Catholic and Previously-Catholic participants

Results

Currently-Catholic participants mentioned statistically more adults who "Facilitated/Had discussions about religion" than Previously-Catholic participants. No other positive behavior themes differed significantly between the two groups.

Previously-Catholic participants mentioned statistically more adults who "Provided conditional support", "Lacked/Discouraged religious conversations", "Did not model a Catholic lifestyle", and "Negative connections to Catholic activities" than Currently-Catholic participants. "Taught incorrect religion information" and "Disrespected other religions" did not differ significantly between the two groups.

Discussion

- "Facilitated/Had discussions about religion"
 differed significantly between the Currently Catholics and Previously-Catholics. This shows
 the importance of adults having conversations
 and having bad conversations.
- Besides "Facilitated/Had discussions about religion", both groups reported similar amounts of positive behaviors in their religious narratives. Where groups differed was the reporting of negative behaviors, which were more numerous in the memories of the Previously-Catholic.
- Frequency of "Taught incorrect religion information" and "Disrespected other religions" did not differ between the groups. Participants in both groups reported the same amount of adults teaching Catholicism correctly/incorrectly as well as being respectful/close-minded about other religions.

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
